
HORNSEY '200 CLUB' 431.0114

Reading 6 Canterbury 1

Reading took the Men's Cup in fine style, seeing off Canterbury 6-1 to secure the biggest margin of victory in this final for some 15 years.

With player/coach Andy Watts and stalwarts Jonty Clarke and Richard Mantell¹ all set to move on from the club, it was a fitting way for them to sign off with medals around their necks. They sealed their five-goal win as James Carson scored with the final touch of the match, with his brother Tom having scored for Great Britain earlier in the day.

With seven goals it was a fitting finale to this, "the most prestigious knockout tournament in English hockey".

¹ Not so, it turned out to be!

The game started at a lively pace, Scottish international Tommy Alexander making a super save from an early penalty corner. His Reading teammate Monty Jefferson then went on a superb individual run from deep in his own half and was close to creating a wonderful goal.

Reading began to up the ante, and Canterbury's Bill Cain was shown a green card as his side performed a rearguard action. However, they were powerless to prevent Reading's opening goal on 17 minutes, when Imre Gerrits fired across a super pass that Nick Park turned home from close range.

Canterbury went in search of an immediate reply. Will Heywood was inches away from an equaliser after a trademark charge forward.

With the half drawing to a close, Reading made a penalty corner pay dividends, the ball being worked to Andy Watts, who made no mistake. His side then went in search of another but James Carson was denied by a good save from Diccon Stubbings.

Into the second half, Reading further imposed their dominance on the game. Ben Boon charged down the right, firing in a cross that Stubbings did well to parry. However, he was powerless to stop Tim Atkins' magnificent finish into the top corner.

As so often happens, the game took another twist as Canterbury skipper Craig Boyne scored what one journalist described as a contender for goal of the season, volleying home a wonderful aerial to reduce the deficit.

Reading's Park then had a great chance but shot wide at the near post after a slip from a Canterbury defender. With ten minutes to go, the lively Gerrits did make it 4-1 with a neat shot, practically ending Canterbury's resistance.

With confidence at a high, Watts then added a stylish fifth, before Carson made it 6-1 with the final touch of the game at a penalty corner.

The attack minded high tempo game adopted by coach Kwan Browne has continued to be the team's approach this season. It started with a hard won 4-0 win at home to Brooklands, who had beaten Hampstead earlier in a warm-up tournament at Surbiton when the 1st XI squad was short of numbers. Brooklands are always strong opponents and the two second half goals secured a welcome win but lots of effort had to be applied (as the players testified after the game).

Wimbledon may not have been at their strongest early in the season owing to injuries but were still a stern test. Hampstead scored two fine short corner goals to come away with a draw. At Surbiton Hampstead attacked deep into the second half after falling a goal behind to a penalty stroke. It was thought that they had been awarded their own but the decision was over turned and former Hampstead goalkeeper Gibson then repeatedly saved shots that would have produced an equaliser.

After Canterbury's Craig Boyne had shot recklessly over the cross bar by some distance, Hampstead sensed that the visitors were not as focused as had been expected. Mikie Watt came away with four goals as Hampstead ran out 7-0 winners.

The game at Beeston was a repeat of last season's visit. Beeston opened the scoring with a Gleghorne short corner but this season Hampstead equalised through Chris Cargo. Gleghorne scored a second but this was quickly equalised by captain Toby Roche, who had taken up a new position for this game in the forward line. In the second half Beeston took the lead with a shot on the reverse from Dixon rather against the run of play.

It was then all Hampstead for 20 or so minutes but they were once again thwarted by a packed defence and a goalkeeper in inspired form. With two minutes to go Hampstead sacrificed their goalkeeper for an on-field player. When on a lone attack Beeston were awarded a short corner in overtime, Ward converted it, as he had in similar circumstances last year when he was playing for Holcombe and that gave an unjustified skew to the final 4-2 scoreline.

Matches with East Grinstead are always tense and close-run things and this season's home game was more of the same. Chris Cargo robbed the ball on the visitor's 25-yard line and had the equivalent of a shoot-out, facing only the goalkeeper and managed to score for an early lead but Hampstead then missed several opportunities from close range and had to settle for a 2-2 draw.

Against Reading, amidst the fireworks on a Saturday night at Sonning, South Africa's Matt Guise-Brown scored the game's first penalty corner after four minutes. Reading looked dangerous on the counter attack and converted their only short corner to tie the game at 1-1 after 8 minutes. Matt then put the Hampstead back in front shortly after with another trademark corner drag flick. And seven minutes before the half time Toby Roche tapped in for his second goal in three games.

On the stroke of half time, Reading scored again to make it 3-2 and far too close for comfort.

The second half was entertaining, but goalless. Hampstead exerted significant control of the ball in the last five minutes and came away with the three points.

Sevenoaks had found life a little tough in their first season in the Premier League but came away from the next game suggesting that there really was little difference between the two teams, save of course for five goals. Good finishing saw Hampstead claim six, with the visitors scoring through their reliable short corner routine.

After a pleasing 3-2 win against Holcombe after two text book corner conversions by Matt Guise Brown, Hampstead started the reverse fixtures for the season with a Saturday night visit to Saint Hill. This turned out to be a repeat of the experience at Beeston and it remains a mystery how the team came away pointless. With their win, East Grinstead pulled into fifth position, one behind Hampstead in fourth at the mid-way stage.

Retirement

In November, Mikie Watt, the 1st XI forward, announced his retirement from international hockey. He had represented Ireland for 12 years, winning 201 caps, Olympic qualification and a European Championship bronze medal. He scored 57 goals (and not the 54 officially recorded).



He started his hockey life at home in Belfast and played at 8 years old. Later at the Royal Belfast Academical Institution, he decided that hockey, rather than rugby, was the way forward and played alongside Mark Gleghorne as captain, in days that still hold his best hockey memories. He went on to win the Irish Senior Cup with Instonians in 2004 whilst still at school but then played four years for Grange HC when at Edinburgh University. It was then that he made his Irish debut aged 19.

His first major event was the qualifying tournament for the 2008 Olympic Games. He scored twice in a 4-0 against France. However, the team missed out on goal difference. The team again missed out narrowly to Korea for participation in the London Olympic Games four years later, which ranks as the biggest regret in his hockey career.

He then played for Dragons in Belgium, followed by RS Tennis in Spain and SCHC in Holland. He helped Ireland to qualify in Antwerp for the Rio Games and won the bronze medal at the European Championships after defeating England that brought about as well a rise in the world rankings.

Other Men's teams

The 2nd XI leads the London League Premier Division once again, with 31 points, by five points over Wimbledon in second, Spencer in third and Reading in fourth places, having won 10 and a draw and the one loss.

In Division 1, Zak Hond XI are in fourth place, three points off the lead. The 3rd XI is struggling this season in the same League, with 8 points, three from the foot of the table. In Division 2, Hampstead 4's is in sixth place and the 5th XI is in 11th (on goal difference)

In Division 5, the Hammers are second to London Royals, two points adrift and in Division 6, the Thirsts XI is top with 30 points and the Spaniards XI in second, having played one game fewer but also with 30 points,. The team in third place is eight points distant.

The Vets are sixth in the Veterans League 1 and the Supervets are fourth in the Supervets Division 2.

International Hockey

Hampstead's Harry Martin has been busy with Great Britain duty in a three match test series against Germany in November and then for England in the World League Finals in India in December.

Germany 5 Great Britain 3

Great Britain were edged out by Germany in their three-match test series opener in Mannheim on 13 November 2017.

Luke Taylor of Surbiton marked his first Great Britain cap with a goal while Tom Carson and Barry Middleton were also on target. However two goals from Dieter Linnekogel and strikes from Christopher Ruhr, Dan Luong Nguyen and Marco Miltkau saw Germany to a 5-3 win.

Great Britain took the lead after ten minutes when Taylor converted from a penalty corner but Linnekogel levelled from a German penalty corner nine minutes later. Barry Middleton was on target to put GB back into the lead but Linnekogel scored again, from a penalty corner, to level the scores before half time.

On 38 minutes Carson put GB back into the lead again as he marked his return to competitive international hockey after an injury lay off. The hosts rallied to finish strongly to stage a late comeback. First, Nguyen put home a penalty corner before Ruhr and Miltkau field goals put Germany into a late 5-3 lead.

Germany 3 Great Britain 3

On 14 November 2017, Great Britain and Germany played out a thrilling 3-3 draw in Mannheim. Goals from Liam Ansell and Luke Taylor put GB into an early two-goal lead before Germany fought back in the second half through Mats Grambusch and Marco Miltkau. An Adam Dixon goal put GB back into the lead but German captain Grambusch was on target again to rescue a draw for his side.

Bobby Crutchley rotated his large squad for this contest, in which Ed Horler made his Great Britain debut. GB raced into the lead just as they did in the first match of the series, Ansell scoring a field goal on 11 minutes before Taylor netted his second in two games from a penalty corner to extend the lead.

However, after the half-time break, Germany fought back and two goals in two minutes saw them draw level. Grambusch was first on target and Miltkau converted a penalty corner moments later. GB put themselves back into the lead with ten minutes to go through Dixon but Grambusch found the net with five minutes to go.

Germany 6 Great Britain 2

Great Britain lost the final match of the series. Captain Phil Roper and Chris Grassick were both on target for GB but this was not enough to fight back against a powerful start from the hosts. Ollie Willars made his 100th international appearance and Henry Weir picked up his 50th GB cap.

Germany flew out the blocks and raced into a three-goal lead inside the first ten minutes through goals from Haner, Prinz and Bruns. Phil Roper gave GB a lifeline on thirteen minutes from a penalty corner but his German counterpart Grambusch cancelled this out before the half-time break. Then Mats Grambusch found the net.

The second half was a much tighter contest and it took until 52 minutes for the game's next goal when Staib found the target. GB struck back a minute later through Grassick to finish the scoring.

Speaking after the match head coach Bobby Crutchley said: "It was a poor start to the game conceding three goals in eight minutes. The players must learn that international hockey demands the highest intensity from the first whistle".

Odisha World League Finals

England fell to defeat against a strong German outfit in the opening game of the Odisha Hockey World League Finals in India. Second quarter goals from Mats Grambusch and Christopher Ruhr were enough for the Germans to come away with the victory, despite England starting the game on top. Bobby Crutchley's side did have good chances of their own through Liam Ansell and Phil Roper but goalkeeper Tobias Walter was on hand to thwart both efforts.

But on the whole, it was Germany who dominated much of the game against an England team missing three players due to illness to start their tournament in the best possible fashion. Much of the possession belonged with England early on as they initially started the sharper of the two sides, with Mark Gleghorne stretching Ansell testing Walter inside the first seven minutes. The world number five outfit then sprang into life at the start of the second quarter. Niklas Bruns slapped a shot wide after substitute 'keeper Harry Gibson made a good save, down low to his left.

But just three minutes later Germany took the lead as Martin Zwicker raced up the centre of the field before feeding Florian Fuchs. The midfielder kept his composure to set up Grambusch to tuck his effort into an empty goal. Germany then kept on piling on the pressure and extended their lead in the 26th minute, when Ruhr unleashed a fearsome shot past Gibson after a fantastic run down the right by Fuchs.

England then held firm despite continued dominance by their opponents in the third quarter, forcing Constantin Staib and Grambusch into speculative reverse stick efforts from narrow angles. Then, in a rare foray forward in the 41st minute, Roper, who was making his 50th England appearance, almost snuck a shot between Walter's legs but could not quite connect perfectly and the German 'keeper did well to keep it out.

His opposite number George Pinner, nominated for the FIH Goalkeeper of the Year earlier in the day, then instinctively kept out a deflection from Dan Nguyen to make sure the lead did not increase at the end of the third quarter. A yellow card for Marco Miltkau with 11 minutes to play gave England an opportunity and they almost took advantage immediately but Sam Ward was deemed to have not touched Gleghorne's vicious cross on its way into the goal, despite a referral. That was to be as good as it got in the final quarter, as Germany closed out the game to avenge their loss to England in the bronze medal game during the summer's EuroHockey Championships.

Sam Ward's stunning strike secured England's first win of the Finals in a thrilling game against India.

The hosts looked like they had completed a remarkable comeback as Akashdeep Singh and Rupinder Singh struck in the final quarter to wipe away England's initial two goal lead after earlier goals from Ward and David Goodfield. But, with just three minutes remaining, David Condon found Beeston's Ward in the circle before the forward smashed the ball into the roof of the net to hand England a first win against India and in India since January 2014. After the game Ward said that having team-mates Brendan Creed and Harry Martin back from illness (having missed the opening game with Germany) - was crucial to their victory.

Both teams started at a lively tempo and created early chances, Akashdeep forcing Harry Gibson into a second minute save before Goodfield scuffed a golden opportunity wide shortly after. India then nearly took the lead at the start of the second period only for Chinglensana Kangujam to miss the target completely.

Mark Gleghorne's penalty corner (England's first of the tournament) was then well charged down in the 25th minute but seconds later England took the lead after Goodfield's cross was diverted into his own goal by goalkeeper Suraj Karkera. That goal stunned a previously vociferous home crowd into

silence. They awoke four minutes after half-time as Gibson produced a marvellous save to keep out a well hit strike from the edge of the circle.

However, they went quiet once again two minutes before the end of the third quarter as Ward scored his 20th goal for England, taking full advantage as Harmanpreet Singh failed to control a routine aerial in his own circle by sliding the ball past Karkera.

The defender almost immediately made amends a minute later as Gibson kept out a penalty corner that sparked India into life as they won another at the start of the final period of play. George Pinner did well to keep out Rupinder's initial effort but the ball bounced up kindly for Akashdeep to nudge into the England goal.

Three minutes later, spurred on by the partisan home support, India levelled the scores as Rupinder snuck a vicious flick in between Pinner and Barry Middleton on the goal line. The drama was not finished there, as both teams continued to press hard. Condon thought that he should have been given a penalty corner with four minutes remaining after a powerful run. He controlled his frustration at the decision well and played an instrumental part in setting up the winner by playing an intelligent pass to Ward, who did well to manufacture some room before unleashing an unstoppable effort to win the game.

Barry Middleton's 400th international appearance ended in dramatic style as England clung on to draw with Australia in their final pool game. Having levelled the scores with six minutes remaining through Phil Roper, Harry Gibson and his defenders kept out four penalty corners in the final minute of the game to deny Australia their first win of the tournament.



England had taken the lead early on through Liam Ansell but Australia hit back in the third quarter, equalising through Dylan Wotherspoon before Blake Govers gave them the lead. That result, coupled with Germany's win over India, ensured that England finished second in the group on four points from their three matches.

Buoyed by victory against India, England began confidently and opened the scoring with the game's first attack as Ansell dinked the ball home after a good run by David Goodfield. Lachlan Sharp's 10th minute shot was superbly smothered by George Pinner before Liam Sanford and Henry Weir then put in crucial blocks to keep out an Australian penalty corner in the 13th minute.

The reigning Hockey World League champions continued to press in the second period but England's defence held firm. Middleton, only the fifth player to ever feature in 400 international games, pulled off a heroic diving block to thwart Tom Wickham in the 24th minute, before substitute goalkeeper Harry Gibson made a smart save to keep out a Govers penalty corner.

The pressure eventually told early in the second half though as Matthew Swann picked out Wotherspoon, who swept the ball past Pinner to equalise, despite an England review. Pinner then showed why he has been nominated as the FIH Goalkeeper of the Year with an incredible double save in the 36th minute to deny, first, a diving Jeremy Edwards and then Wickham's follow up effort.

Wickham was then kept out by Pinner again moments later but the Kookaburras won a penalty corner on review and Govers smashed it home to give his side the lead with just under 20 minutes remaining.

England began the final quarter in much more attacking fashion and won a penalty corner early on, only for Luke Taylor's effort to be well charged down before Goodfield slapped a shot wide.

But with just six minutes remaining the ball broke kindly for Roper just a couple of yards out from goal and the midfielder nudged it over Tristan Clemons to grab a point for his team.

England then defended heroically to keep out four penalty corners in the final 30 seconds – the third one hitting the post twice – in a dramatic end to another pulsating game.

England's quest for an Final medal was ended by a dogged Argentina at the quarter-final stages in India. Adam Dixon's final minute effort gave England a chance of setting up a grandstand finish but it was ultimately not enough to stop the Olympic champions from claiming their first win of the tournament and a place in the semi finals.

David Condon's fearsome strike just before half-time gave his side a chance after earlier goals from Lucas Vila and Martin Paredes. Vila controlled the game on his 200th appearance and won a penalty stroke in the 34th minute which Juan Gilardi smartly converted to restore his side's two goal advantage that would prove too much for England to overcome, despite Dixon's late goal.

The first quarter was a rather cagey affair as both sides tried to settle into the game, with neither creating any clear-cut chances. In the 21st minute the game rather unexpectedly sprang into life as a hopeful ball into the circle deflected off Vila's stick and over George Pinner's leg to open the scoring for Argentina. Eight minutes later that lead was doubled as a deflected aerial fell kindly for captain Paredes, who skipped his way into the circle before squeezing a reverse stick shot between Pinner's legs.

England hit back immediately as Condon smashed the ball past Juan Vivaldi after Barry Middleton's pass fell kindly for him after a partial block to give his team hope going into the break. However, England's defence was breached once again four minutes after half-time, as a scintillating move by Argentina saw Harry Gibson bring down Vila in the area, with Gilardi easily converting the resulting penalty stroke.

The Argentinians then once again set about keeping their opponents out while Vila forced Gibson into a save with a fierce shot in the 41st minute. England pushed hard in the final quarter to find a way back into the game, winning four penalty corners and eventually finding a way past Vivaldi after Lucas Rossi diverted Dixon's cross past his own goalkeeper. There was to be no dramatic equaliser for England, as their 30 year winless streak against their opponents continued, having not beaten them since a 2-1 victory at the 1986 World Cup.

The World League Final campaign ended for England with a narrow defeat to the Netherlands in a tight and tense encounter, for the seventh and eighth spots. Mirco Pruijser scored the game's only goal in the third quarter as both sides struggled to get to grips with a sodden pitch and very tricky overhead conditions.

Harry Martin, Chris Griffiths and Mark Gleghorne all had good chances for England but on each occasion they were halted by goalkeeper Sam van der Ven. There was some consolation when Liam Sanford was named the Junior Player of the Match for the third consecutive game at the end of the tournament.

With the rain teeming down from the start both teams took a while to settle, with Sanford excelling in defence and preventing George Pinner from getting in on the action in his 100th England game. The game came into life in the 24th minute, when David Condon broke through two tackles and raced into the Dutch circle before finding Griffiths, only for the forward to be thwarted by an onrushing van der Ven.

Seconds later the Dutch almost scored themselves as Valentin Verga showed great skill to get past Gleghorne but Harry Gibson was out quickly to make an athletic save with his left hand. England then raced up the other end once again, with Sam Ward unlucky not to find a team-mate with a cross before Martin showed some superb 3D skills to beat three defenders, only to see van der Ven block his effort as well.

With the rain worsening during the break the second half began with large puddles forming on the pitch, making the going even harder as the ball struggled to cross the surface. This hampered England's plans during their first penalty corner in the 32nd minute but the ball still found its way to David Goodfield, only for the midfielder to smash a reverse stick effort into the wrong side of the goal.

The conditions certainly did not affect Verga ten minutes later though as he went on a mazy run before producing a cheeky pass to Pruijser, who expertly steered the ball into the corner of Pinner's goal to open the scoring. With six minutes remaining England won a second penalty corner that Gleghorne thundered towards goal but, once again, van der Ven was on hand to keep it out.

Thijs van Dam then had a glorious effort to wrap up the win with three minutes remaining but could not divert his shot into an open goal after barging his way past two defenders. However, this proved inconsequential, as the Dutch held on to claim their first win of the tournament.

In the other games in the tournament, Argentina were joined in the semi-final games by Germany, who defeated the Netherlands 4-3 on a shoot-out after a 3-3 draw in usual time and by Australia and India. Germany suffered a 0-3 defeat to Australia, despite having one injured player and five unable to play because of illness.

Belgium defeated Spain 1-0 to claim fifth place, with their opponents placed sixth.

In the final Australia overcame Argentina 3-2 and retained the trophy won two years ago. For the bronze medal, India beat Germany 2-1 in an extraordinary game, won 2-1 by the hosts.

It was fair from straight-forward for India. Germany's semi-final performance against Australia had attracted huge praise on Saturday, going down to a narrow defeat despite having only the 13 fit players available due to illness.

With two more players going down over night, Germany found themselves having to face host the home favourites with a squad of 11, which included reserve goalkeeper Mark Appel who played as a striker.

It proved to be one of the most remarkable matches of the event, with Germany holding their own against India for long periods. They went into half time having ten shots at goal in comparison with India's three, although India had the lead, thanks to SV Sunil's excellent finish in the 21st minute following a fine reaction save from Germany's Tobias Walter.

Unexpectedly, Germany drew level six minutes into the third quarter from the most unlikely of sources, with reserve goalkeeper Appel, free on an inside left channel, to lift the ball over the onrushing Indian goalkeeper Suraj Karkera and into the net. The strike sparked wild celebrations from the German team, all keen to congratulate their goalie on his first ever international goal.

However, India scored again to take the game - and the medal.

The Euro Hockey League will trial a new points system for the season among a number of new innovations. This is noteworthy as several EHL initiatives tend to find their way into main stream hockey.

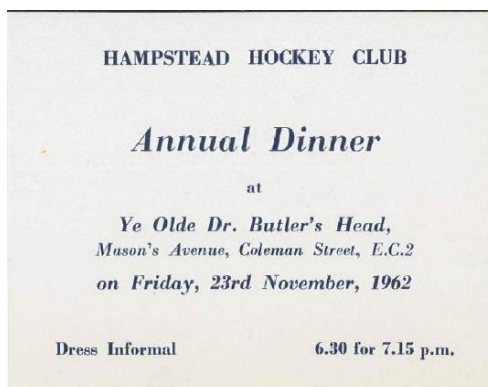

Every penalty corner and every goal from a penalty stroke that came about from a penalty corner will earn one point.

For every Field Goal and a Penalty Stroke Goal scored in a match NOT resulting from a Penalty Corner	2 Points
For every Penalty Corner scored in a match	1 Point
For every goal scored from a Penalty Stroke resulting from a Penalty Corner situation.	1 Point
In a shoot-out competition a goal from a direct Shoot-out and a Penalty Stroke	1 Point

SHARPSHOOTER DEEGAN GIVES HAMPSTEAD VICTORY

Hampstead gained their first victory of the season on the Spencer cricket club ground yesterday. They have been short of goalscorers this year and, in this match, it was only their centre half, Deegan, who pulled them through with his ability to strike hard and accurately at corners.

Thus, their attacks were contained somewhat desperately by a defence, which was given time to get back unto position. Even so, Spencer should have scored more than one goal before the interval. This was a good individual effort by Wagle, who broke through the defence and dribbled the ball into the net.

Hampstead did not look dangerous near the circle. Deegan early in the game decided to risk all and come up with his forwards whenever possible. He looked the most likely goalscorer against a defence in which Anderson and Prior excelled.

Qualities: The name says it all. Renowned worldwide for his Shabaz and drop of the shoulders.

Detriments: Led astray too easily by The Horse and the Arscott brothers and cries a little too easily when the coach shouts at him. Also has some serious schizophrenic issues to deal with when consuming alcohol.

Mark has had a busy and diverse career after his time with the Men's 1st XI. He spent five years with Diageo as a global strategy manager and then strategy director for greater China. This was followed by his appointment as commercial director for Diageo's whisky brands in Europe.

In 2009, he became Executive Assistant and Chief of Staff to LOCOG's Chief Executive before becoming the head of the pre-Olympic Games events in November 2010. In May 2012 he became the Head of Olympic Park operations for the duration of the Olympic Games.

In 2013, Mark joined Tough Mudder³ that has become a world leader in mass participation sports events businesses, with participation by more than 2,500,000 people worldwide. After his time in New York in that post, Mark became Chief Executive of Madison Sports Group in London, to launch a series of professional cycling events across Europe.

Will Mark recollect 21 October 2001 and the Premier League game against Teddington? Probably not, so here is a report, penned by Dave Sellick.

³ Tough Mudder is an endurance event series in which participants attempt 10–12 mile-long obstacle courses that tests mental as well as physical strength. The main principle of the Tough Mudder revolves around teamwork. It was co-founded by Will Dean, a former British counter terrorism officer, and Guy Livingstone, a former corporate lawyer. The obstacles often play on common human fears, such as fire, water, electricity and heights.

Hampstead started the game the brighter, and piled pressure on the home side's goal. After barely three minutes Mike Williamson shuffled his silver dancing shoes into position and fired a centre into the opposition's circle. The Teddington back line appeared to lose sight of the onrushing Max [Mayer -Aull] (no mean achievement), who finished clinically at the far post.

Twelve minutes in, the lead was doubled. The first goal owed everything to youthful exuberance, but the second was a demonstration that experience is irreplaceable. The two men involved certainly have it in spades. A free hit deep in Teddington territory was fired into the circle by Soma Singh and Immy Bhatti deflected it neatly into the goal.

The remainder of the half saw Hampstead contain their opponents whilst launching frequent raids, mostly through Craig Carolan, who seemed to be enjoying himself so much he forgot to barrack the umpires and his teammates. The half ended with two sharp corner saves by Gregor Maier, who also provided an excellent running commentary on the game, never staying quiet for more than a micro-second.

In the second half, Hampstead dropped deeper and absorbed significant pressure. The ability of Justin 'Jabba' King to launch scud like aerials into the opposition half was always a means of clearing the lines. It was from one such bomb that the match clinching goal arose. The Teddington back line, not for the first time, nor the last, helpfully missed the overhead.

This freed Mark Darbon to run at the opposition's defence. With his confidence at an all-time high now his scoring duck has been broken, Darbon moved forward menacingly. He was however quickly tackled and the ball broke to Craig Carolan.

Never one to pass up any opportunity to run with the ball, Craig drove into the circle, and slipped the ball to substitute Luke Hodges. Only five yards out, with an open net, against his former club, and with one of his best mates in goal, Luke could have been forgiven for thinking he was dreaming. He managed though to keep sufficient composure to fire the ball home before breaking out into a smile almost as wide as the pitch.
