In Queensland, New Zealand's Women came out victorious against Australia and gained the Olympic qualifying spot, outscoring their opponents 6-5 after the three matches

In the Men's tournament, Australia defeated New Zealand twice, with a 2-2 draw in the second match. Australia therefore booked their place for Tokyo 2020.

The FIH met in Lausanne after the games in Queensland and published the new World Rankings. These led to the draws for the Olympic Games Qualification matches.

GB's Men have been drawn against Malaysia and the Women will tackle Chile.

These matches will be played at Lee Valley on the weekend of 2-3 November 2019. Tickets are set to go on general sale on Monday, 16 September.

Great Britain's Women have never played Chile at a major tournament. Chile are currently ranked 18<sup>th</sup> in the world. Malaysia's Men are ranked 11<sup>th</sup>. Both GB teams need to qualify separately through the two-legged matches. Being reigning Olympic champions does not automatically qualify the Women for the Tokyo Games.

To coincide with the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of D-Day, Chris Somes-Charlton, otherwise known as the Supreme Allied Tour Commander (SATC) and several Bars returned to Belgium with a brigade of merry men armed only with hockey-cum-walking sticks.

***One month later...***

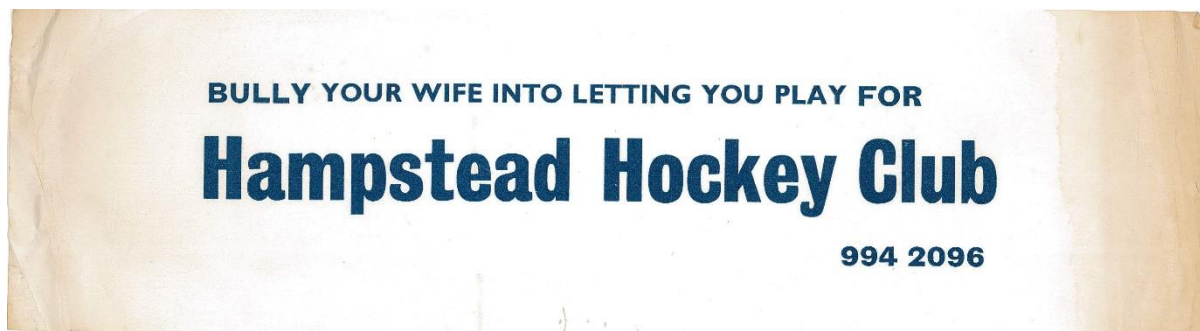
Dear Sir
